Conservation Success, Again!

Thirteen months ago, the Muse published a feature article announcing the acquisition of a 32-acre property now referred to as the Bilston Headwaters Nature Reserve. This venture represented the Metchosin Foundation's first-ever facilitation of land acquisition for the purpose of conservation. We were extremely fortunate to work with BC Parks Foundation (BCPF), which was both the principal funder and an experienced transaction lead.

This first success and the relationship that grew from it has now catalyzed a second significant conservation outcome, in this case, in the heart of a natural wildlife corridor that extends from Race Rocks to Roche Cove, via Mary Hill.

Since 2018 and our efforts to support the SC'IA/NEW First Nation community in exploring the potential for a future Tribal Park (Indigenous Protected Area) at Mary Hill, the Metchosin Foundation has been keen to promote and

facilitate the larger goal of conserving habitat connectivity between Pedder Bay and the Sooke Basin. For the past two years or so, we've also been aware that colleagues at Rocky Point Bird Observatory (RPBO) have been seeking a long-term base of operations within Metchosin's corner of the Pacific Flyway. Late last summer, an opportunity arose to realize these intersecting conservation goals.

A 51-acre parcel of private land abutting Mary Hill and the Galloping Goose Trail came on the market as an estate sale, in late July. The property was fairly-priced and being marketed for subdivision development, so we knew that quick action would be needed if we were to make a competing purchase offer. Once again, the Metchosin Foundation reached out to BCPF, and once again they responded strategically and generously, making a successful purchase offer that closed some months later. Following title transfer, work began on a more detailed evaluation of the

property's ecological significance and initial outreach was made to RPBO regarding the site's potential to offer a new base of operations.

It turns out that the property is even more ecologically significant than a desk-top analysis and initial site visits would have suggested. Rosa Munzer, President of RPBO, observed that, "On this property, birds are everywhere." The property's position on the Pacific Flyway means that during spring and fall migrations, hundreds of thousands of birds—if not millions—pass overhead. Its diverse landscape of Garry oak meadows, ponds, Coastal Douglas-fir forests that include veteran old-growth trees, cedar and maple groves provides essential stopover habitat for species ranging from Golden-crowned Sparrows to the Northern Saw-whet Owl. Rosa also advised that "RPBO's ornithologists are excited by the healthy, abundant numbers of Rufous Hummingbirds we've recorded here. This species—which has lost half

its population since 1970—is in precipitous decline elsewhere on Southern Vancouver Island, but not here."

To protect the birds and other wildlife and to support stewardship of the property, public access will be through participation in Rocky Point Bird Observatory's public walks, talks, and volunteering opportunities throughout the year (available to book at Discoverparks.ca). A resident RPBO caretaker for the property moved into the property's existing 1980s home at the end of May.

Beyond supporting RPBO programs, the property will advance broader ecological research and wildlife monitoring efforts. The Metchosin Foundation has undertaken an initial survey of forest cover type, veteran tree locations and the most frequently used game trails. We have been inspired to see the degree to which the property supports a diverse population of large mammals. We now look forward to working with the Metchosin Biodiversity Project, to facilitate spring and fall "bio blitz" programs that will shed more light on the fauna, flora and fungi that call this special property home.

Please join us in thanking BC Parks Foundation for establishing this important new natural area in Metchosin and in welcoming RPBO to their new home. Please also visit metchosinfoundation.ca to see more photos and videography of the site.

2025 Property Taxes

You are reminded that property taxes are due by Wednesday, July 2, 2025. Claim your Home Owner Grant with the Province online or by phone before the property tax due date to avoid penalty on that portion of taxes. Complete the application on line at gov.bc.ca/homeownergrant or by phone 1-888-355-2700.

If you defer your taxes, you still need to claim your Home Owner Grant (if eligible). Cheques can be post-dated to the July 2, 2025 due date. The Municipality does not accept credit cards. You can also pay through your financial institution.

There is a drop box for cheques at the Municipal Hall to the right of the front door.

A mandatory 5% penalty will be applied to any current taxes outstanding after the July 2 due date and an additional 5% penalty will apply after August 5.

Property tax notices were mailed out early in mid-May, due to the possibility of a Canada Post strike. If you have not received your property tax notice by mid-June, please contact the Municipal hall. 250-474-3167.

Deferment of Taxes

Municipalities no longer accept deferment renewals or new applications. Eligible BC residents may apply online or renew their applications to BC's property tax deferment program. Find out more at gov.bc.ca/propertytaxdeferment. For questions about property tax deferral, please call 1-888-355-2700.

As events go, ArtPod's recent AGM was a minor affair. Except, ArtPod has a new President. It is true that this person, Memet Burnett, is a founding member so has been a driving force from the get-go in crafting what the artist-run gallery has become, but more from the raucous backseat. Now she is in the driver's seat! As she said in her acceptance speech to outgoing President, Diana Smith (this writer), "you are the Whoa! to my Yahoo!". It is so true! Do we want a popcorn maker for openings she has asked? "How about light bulbs and some painters tape instead?" the finance committee might reply.

Memet has often been the instigator of many of the more innovative ArtPod initiatives over the years such as 'Café de Love', the vintage-style cabaret of music and poetry and pastries, and the poetry workshops inspired by art in the gallery. Anything Memet has her hand in often includes dress-up and fun. Given clothing styles, she could just as accurately have described the transition of Presidents 'from frumpy to fantastic', but tactfully didn't! Her own art reflects her many loves, of marine life, particularly whales, of ceramics, and of life in general.

Memet has been and continues to be the programming guru responsible, along with the collective, for themes of the bi-monthly shows. The current show, 'Pattern: rEpEAT, rEpEAT, rEpEAT,' runs to July 20. Please do not expect wallpaper-like interpretations of the theme as art. Hopefully, when you visit the show, you will be surprised

and intrigued. The opening reception is on Saturday, May 31 from 2:00-4:00 pm with guest juror Pierrette Vezina. Everyone is welcome and, who knows, there may be popcorn!

Pierrette is offering a workshop to go along with the current show on Saturday, June 21, 12:30-4:30 pm. Called 'Patterns of the Everyday', participants will use all kinds of water-based materials such as acrylic and watercolour paint and markers to construct a concertina book.

A call-out for submissions to ArtPod's next show, Fleeting: Exalting the Ephemeral, opens June 1. The theme is all that is transitory and temporary albeit that most of the artworks will likely be permanent. Artists are invited to make work that explores the nature of the fleeting, qualities that define experiences, moments, and states that are inherently temporary and ever-changing. As the curators for the show, Phyllis Schwartz and Edward Peck are encouraging "works that contemplate impermanence, where nothing remains fixed, where subtle shifts and delicate transformations can go unnoticed". Daniel Laskarin, a locally-based artist, is the guest juror. He has a varied and fascinating art practice including making all kinds of intriguing sculptures, samples of which will likely be on display during the show.

Like Memet, another thinker-outside-the-box at ArtPod is local artist, Dyan Marie. The next event that is part of her year-long Oceans Project is a celebration of World Ocean Day on Saturday, June 8. It begins with a free Gyotaku

workshop, 11:00am-12.30pm, in Metchosin Arts and Cultural Centre Association's (MACCA's) Event Room. Gyotaku is an ancient Japanese art form which uses fish to make prints and generally honour the details and beauty of marine life. Dyan will also lead a Metchosin Ocean Art Walk from 1:00-2:00 pm. It starts from MACC and includes a discussion at Sea Bluff Farm called 'Fish and Fishing in our Place and Time'. Although free, those interested in the workshop are asked to register at dyanmarie@merchosinartpod.ca. Dyan, a resident of Spirit Bay, finds it 'breathtakingly beautiful here'. She believes the act of walking slows us down, so we notice the amazingly rich environment around us. "When we notice it we are more likely to take

Westshore Garden Tour

The deck of the Kivari family home on Arden Road overlooks their unique rural property reflecting the talents of its owners: Jennifer, a mixed-media artist, and Kevin, a busy mechanic. It is both calming and energizing. They purchased their two acres with house and barn in 1989 then proceeded to transform it into an exceptional feast for the eyes that Jennifer refers to as "a collaborative art project with Mother Nature". Kevin's shop is in the barn and the hayloft was converted to an art studio in 2007. This is where Jennifer creates her eclectic art pieces. The family's artistic imagination has spilled onto their property with found objects, pieces of machinery, an enormous, human-constructed nest with glowing eggs high in the trees, paths and seating areas, chickens, and planter beds, as well as an ancient flatbed truck which doubles as a sunny space to grow vegetables, to sit and watch outdoor movies or to hold her brother's jazz/reggae band: 3B's, with brother, Joel on bass, Tim on guitar, and Ozzie on drums. They will be playing during the garden tour.

The delightful Kivari property is only one of five private gardens slated for the Westshore Garden Tour hosted by Soroptimist International which takes place on Saturday, June 21. There are five gardens on this year's tour: one in View Royal on Portage Inlet, two in Metchosin, one in Langford and one in the Highlands on Millstream Lake Road, a 25 minute drive from the Kivari Garden. The tour is self-guided so can be started at any of the participating venues or at the Garden Gathering at Emery Hall starting at 10:00 am. Emery Hall is located on Glencairn Lane off Sooke Road and Yeta Lane behind St. John's the Baptist Heritage Church where there will be a craft market, music, and the opportunity to purchase boxed lunches for \$15 to enjoy either at the Hall or in one of the gardens along the way. Lunch options are gluten free, vegetarian, regular, or GF vegetarian and will include a sandwich, small salad, a square, and a bottle of water.



Joan Jackson has been a Soroptimist for decades and explained that the organization, which had its beginnings in Oakland, California, now has chapters world-wide, and has been helping others for 104 years. Locally, one of their programs is Anney's Closet, a "free store" for women who are transitioning to a new living situation after aging out of foster care or fleeing violence or abuse. They have many other projects on the go: such as making lunches for elderly shut-ins through Better at Home. It is completely volunteer-run and is an organization well worth supporting.

The 2025 Westshore Garden Tour is the second that the group has hosted. The first was in 2019 but COVID struck the following year which brought their garden fundraiser to a halt. Having attended the first, I am not about to miss the second because the first tour was a fun and memorable event.



Where Water Leads Us: Metchosin Ocean Art Walk

On a bright spring Earth Day this past April 22, the first Metchosin Ocean Art Walk set out from the Metchosin Arts and Cultural Centre (MACC), making its way toward the sea. The walk, part of a three-part series continuing on World Ocean Day (June 8) and Canada Day (July 1), blends community-engaged art and ecological exploration. It was as much about attention to place as it was about distance: pausing to listen, share knowledge, and look closely along the way.

After viewing Flow: 'The Ways of Water', a large-scale painting created over the past year with wide community participation at MACC's Point of View Gallery, one of the most memorable stops came at Sea Bluff Farm. There, farmer Sasha Kubicek welcomed the group with ecological insight and spirited storytelling. Surrounded by experimental organic plots and native hedgerows, Sasha described his work not only as healthy food production but as long-view environmental stewardship and a passionate commitment to restoring soil and native habitats.

He also introduced us to resilient solitary wild bees that thrive in these hedgerows. They are, remarkably, more effective at pollination than domestic honeybees. Unlike hive-dependent species, these native bees live alone and flourish in biodiverse, pesticide-free environments like those being restored at Sea Bluff. Many of the plants used in the hedgerows come from Satinflower Nursery, a local centre dedicated exclusively to native and ecologically meaningful species.

The farm is also helping restore Garry oak ecosystems, one of the most endangered habitats in British Columbia. We wandered through small pocket gardens of native plants, reintroduced to the landscape. Some, like camas (Camassia quamash), once an important traditional food for Indigenous peoples, can take up to seven years from seed to first flowering.

Looking ahead to World Ocean Day on June 8, the next Ocean Art Walk begins at MACC from 11:00 am-12:30 pm with a Gyotaku printmaking demonstration, where participants are invited to create prints from fish, octopus, and seaweed. From there, the group will walk to Sea Bluff Farm for a roundtable discussion from 1:00-2:00 pm, titled 'Fish and Fishing in Our Place and Time'. This onehour symposium will bring together a range of perspectives on the ocean that surrounds us, and on local fish and fishing, as part of the World Ocean Day programming.

Framed by the theme 'Fish and Fishing in Our Place and Time', the conversation may explore environmental monitoring, cultural knowledge, sustainable practices, and species-specific stories related to Vancouver Island's marine ecosystems. It may also consider the varied ways we think about fish: as food; as poetic silvery flashes through water; and as sentient beings, complex and connected within vast and shifting systems in a relationship of rhythm and reciprocity. Fish are indicators of ecological health, objects of industry and sustenance, and, for many, figures of story, ceremony, and survival. Some return home against the current. Others, like the rockfish, hover unseen in the deep.

Rockfish dwell among Vancouver Island's rocky reefs and kelp forests, often remaining in the same crevice for decades. With over 35 strikingly beautiful species in local waters, some living more than 100 years, these fish give birth to live young and are rarely

seen except when brought up from the depths. Their sharp dorsal spines can deliver a painful, venomous sting, and their inflated swim bladders make them especially vulnerable during catch-and-release.

In addition to invited speakers, we recognize the deep knowledge held within the local community and warmly invite you to contribute to this open, diverse discussion about the ocean that surrounds us. This gathering is also intended as a community-building opportunity to meet, connect, and share our enthusiasm for place by exploring how local waters

shape our lives, livelihoods, cultures, and imaginations.

The final Ocean Art Walk takes place on Canada Day (July 1) as part of MACCA's Festivus. The self-guided route can be enjoyed after on-site celebrations wind down and where you can discover art projects such as Memet Burnett's 'Haiku Path' and a poetry workshop, Edward Pecks 'Photo Walk Project' and Art Brendon's salmon sidewalk murals: a "fish run" of art making its way upstream. The full programme of Ocean Art Walk exhibitions, events, and maps will be available at MACC to help guide your experience.

The spring session of the Free Range Singers finished at the end of


May, but we anticipate starting up again in September and we would love to have new members join us! Choir fees are very affordable, and inability to pay is not a barrier.

Moralea's Meadow Open Day 2025

The second annual Open Day at Moralea's Meadow on May 11 was a great success. Sometimes during the long hours of weeding and planting, the volunteers might feel that the job of restoring native plants to the Meadow is just too big and no one is noticing. The warm expressions of appreciation from the 182 people who toured the Meadow turned those feelings around. Many people had never noticed the Meadow was there and were excited to discover it for the first time. Our greeters sometimes had to be persuasive to entice some Farmers' Market goers into the Meadow but, once there, most were intrigued by what they saw. For some people, just seeing the plants was enough. For others, hearing the stories about Moralea Milne, indigenous camas cultivation, the role of native pollinators, and restoration techniques deepened their experience. Potted Garry Oak seedlings were available by donation and camas flowers (from private property) were handed out. Many people accepted a Moralea's Meadow bookmark with images of camas and contact information.

Oak meadows are not "natural" in the way forested areas may be. They are the result of human intervention to keep invasive grasses and shrubs from smothering the delicate meadow plants. It is only through dedicated effort that these special areas survive. The Moralea's Meadow Volunteer

To support the influx of animals, we've welcomed a team of new summer staff and volunteers and are actively training them to help care for our growing patient list.


To prepare for this busy season, we're also stocking up on

Annual Awards from the Nadene Carline 761 Foundation.

After my wife's death in 2023, the Nadene Carline Foundation was established which provides for two annual awards. One goes to an elementary school child to provide supplementary educational experience which their parents cannot necessarily afford. The second goes to a student teacher to assist either with the cost of their qualification studies or with the cost of acquiring the resource materials which they will need in the classroom and which School Boards do not provide.

In 2023/2024, family and friends donated almost \$100,000 to this foundation. This accumulates interest which in turn provides for two annual awards of \$2,000 each.

In 2024, the student recipient, who must remain anonymous, used the awards to take summer courses in their particular areas of interest. The 2025 recipient has been identified and will receive the award in June or July. This grade five student will use the award to pursue his interest, primarily in construction but also art.

The 2024 student-teacher award winner was Sophie Groves. The criterion for choosing the winner of this award was to be a fledgling teacher who was most likely to follow Nadene's special skills and approach to teaching. Sophie fits this criterion very well. The

winner of this award for 2025 will be chosen later this summer.

Reflecting Nadene's own boundless commitment and generosity towards students and young teachers, we are working towards building the foundation to the point where we can make two awards for both students and student-teachers. Recipe of the Month - Sticky Toffee Pudding

6 oz. chopped pitted dried dates

1 cup water

1/4 cup butter

2/3 cup brown sugar

1 tsp vanilla extract

2 eggs

2 tbsp. molasses

1 tbsp. golden syrup

1 cup + 2 tbsp. all-purpose flour

1 tsp. baking powder

½ tsp. baking soda

Toffee sauce:

½ cup whipping cream

½ cup butter

½ cup brown sugar

1 tbsp. molasses

2 tbsp. golden syrup

2 tsp vanilla extract

- 1. Simmer dates and water in small pan for two minutes.
- 2. Cream together brown sugar, butter, and vanilla.
- 3. Add eggs, molasses, and golden syrup. Beat well.
- 4. Slowly add sifted flour and baking powder mix.
- 5. Blend date mix and add baking soda.
- 6. Mix ingredients together and fill 12 greased and floured muffin tins.
- Bake for 20 mins. at 350 deg.F.
- 8. Gently boil ingredients for sauce for two minutes.
- 9. Serve sauce warm with toffee puddings.

Through email correspondence, thoughtful conversations, and the occasional coffee, I grew to appreciate Jim's enduring passion for all things Metchosin. Whether discussing community projects, local politics, or simply exchanging ideas, his principles and values always shone through.


Jim's dedication to this community spanned decades and touched nearly every corner of Metchosin. His roles included:

- Founding President of the Metchosin Agricultural Advisory Committee, which he helped establish at the request of John Ranns and Jo Mitchell.
- Past President and Vice President of the Metchosin Museum Society.
- Director, past Treasurer and longtime representative of the Association for the Protection of Rural Metchosin.

- Former member of the Metchosin Environmental Advisory Select Committee (MEASC), where he served for years with insight and dedication.
- Former representative for Metchosin on the Peninsula & Area Agricultural Commission.
- Former member of the CRD Regional Parks Strategic Plan Citizens' Advisory Panel.
- Past Treasurer of the former Metchosin Garden Club.
- Long-time volunteer with Wild ARC.
- Board member of the Metchosin Community House.
- Member of the Metchosin Muse team.
- And, of course, a valued member of the Healthy Communities Advisory Select Committee, where his voice remained razor sharp and deeply principled.

Through his many articles in the Muse, Jim spoke with candour and care. He was never afraid to challenge; always striving to contribute. He reminded us that communities are not built by policies alone, but by people with the courage to ask tough questions and stand firmly for what they believe is right.

A passionate advocate for accessibility, Jim long saw what others sometimes missed. He reminded us that a truly inclusive community is one where everyone, regardless of ability, can fully participate and belong. His advocacy continues to influence not

just Metchosin, but the broader region as well.

Jim's strong environmental ethic was rooted in his background in Natural Resource Management, which informed his decades-long advocacy for sustainable practices and protection of our natural surroundings. For many years, he and his wife, Kathleen, opened their hearts and home to a series of senior rescue dogs with medical issues, offering comfort, care, and a second chance to animals often overlooked.

Jim and Kathleen made Metchosin their home, and together helped shape the heart of this place through steadfast involvement, quiet leadership, and deep community care. Jim's legacy lives on in the values he championed and the community he helped to shape.

With deep respect for the strength, determination, and dignity Jim showed throughout his years of service and especially in the face of his recent health challenges, I want to take this moment, on behalf of our committee and our community, to say "thank you".

Thank you, Jim, for believing in Metchosin and for offering your time, your voice, and your heart so generously. We are better because of you. We will carry forward your vision of a more inclusive, engaged, and accountable community.

Birds of Metchosin – Turkey Vulture (Cathartes aura)

Turkey Vultures work on thermals to stay aloft, using their keen sense of smell to locate rotting food from miles away. Although they have been known to finish off dying animals, carrion is their mainstay.

With a wingspan over 1.5 meters, it is blackish, long-tailed, with a small, bare, red head; juveniles have black heads.

Most of our local Vultures arrive by March and migrate south in the fall. They will congregate in mature trees for the night, and spend their days in open spaces, waiting for the right conditions. One morning they head out across the Strait of Juan de Fuca, to winter in California and Arizona. However, a few have been seen over-wintering in Metchosin.

Turkey Vultures are closely related to storks. They are gregarious and can rear one to three youngsters a year, from March to August, in small caves, beneath rock ledges, in hollow trees, tree stumps, or animal burrows and abandoned buildings. They tend to prefer dry, open terrain along roadsides, or at the edges of forest, where foraging is good.

These large, impressive birds do us great service by cleaning up dead and rotting corpses, and their flying acumen fascinates those who
